

CCF NATIONAL EVENT NEWS

CCF NATIONAL SUMMIT AND NATIONAL EARTH AWARDS

The 2017 Civil Contractors Federation Summit was held in Canberra on 20-21 November, incorporating the highly prestigious CCF National Earth Awards which attracted 200 attendees to the 'Great Hall of Parliament House". For many delegates it was their first visit to the Federal Parliament and the Nation's capital, all enjoying a memorable evening that recognised excellence in civil construction across Australia.

FEDERAL INFRASTRUCTURE MINISTER OPENS CCF NATIONAL INFRASTRUCTURE SUMMIT

The former Federal Minister for Infrastructure & Transport, the Hon Darren Chester MP performed the official opening of the 2017 Civil Contractors Federation National Conference in Canberra, confirming the Federal Government's commitment to rollout Australia's major infrastructure projects announced in the 2017 Federal Budget.

Commitments to road construction will account for 70% of national transport infrastructure investment activity, whilst the \$10 billion+ inland rail project initiative accounting for the bulk of rail investment.

The Minister also reaffirmed his ongoing commitment to address road safety with the Government providing over \$15.6 million over four years in funding from the now defunct Road Safety Remuneration Tribunal to the National Heavy Vehicle Regulator for 2017–18 for heavy vehicle safety initiatives. This funding is being used to progress a package of practical initiatives to improve the safety of the heavy vehicle industry.



2017 CCF NATIONAL INFRASTRUCTURE OUTLOOK REPORT LAUNCHED IN CANBERRA

The 2017 CCF National Infrastructure Outlook Report was officially launched at the the offical opening of CCF Summit and presented to the delegates by Adrian Hart, Senior Ecomonist with BIS Oxford Economics.

Key Indicators from the Outlook Report are as follows:

- Forecasts suggest the downturn in measured engineering construction activity still has a way to run, with the bottom of the cycle being 2019/20, with annual work done bottoming out at around \$75 billion.
 Much of this ongoing downturn is due to the completion of the \$200 billion wave of LNG investment projects.
- Overwhelmingly, the biggest driver of the pickup in non-mining civil work from here is the rise in transport infrastructure investment and, specifically, roads and rail construction.
- Publicly funded engineering construction expected to decline significantly through 2019/20. The peaking and moving to completion of major projects across telecommunications (NBN) and roads likely to drive a downturn in publicly funded work in these segments by 2018/19 and 2019/20 respectively. Meanwhile the wave of publicly funded railways work is not expected to peak until the mid-2020s.
- There are large differences in the outlook for engineering construction by state, with New South Wales and Victoria set to see the largest increases over the next two years, following solid growth in 2016/17. By contrast, activity is expected to only grow weakly in Queensland, and remain lower in Western Australia and South Australia by 2019/20. In turn, these states will see relatively weaker growth in state final demand and employment.
- Construction sector employment is projected to fall from 1.14 million persons in 2015/16 to 1.08 million persons by 2019/20 – a direct loss of around 60,000 jobs.



FEDERAL GOVERNMENT ANNOUNCES REVIEW INTO VET ANNOUNCED

The Civil Contractors Federation has welcomed the announcement by the Hon. Karen Andrews, Assistant Minister for Vocational Education and Skills, of a review into vocational education and training (VET) and is inviting stakeholders to have their say on proposed reforms to ensure students receive high quality training that is responsive to the changing needs of industry.

The CCF will be providing a submission into the review that is inviting input via a number of mechanisms including:

- Through the submission process via the Department of Education and Training website portal at www.education.gov.au/VET-consultation
- Comments to the AISC Secretariat mailbox (<u>AISCSecretariat@education.gov.au</u>)
- Participate in face-to-face stakeholder consultation sessions organised by Commonwealth/State and Territory Governments, likely to occur around February/March 2018.

NHVR ELECTRONIC WORK DIARIES

An Electronic Work Diary (EWD) is an electronic device or system approved by the National Heavy Vehicle Regulator (NHVR), to monitor and record the work and rest times of a driver and will be a voluntary alternative to the written work diary.

At this time no EWDs have been approved by the NHVR for use, however the NHVR expects to commence assessment and approvals of EWDs in early 2018. If you currently have an electronic recording system or are looking to purchase one in the near future, make sure you talk to the technology provider about their plans to have that system upgraded to meet the EWD standards.
